CONTINUATION CLASS The Board of Directors of the Talmud Torah have announced that beginning in September 1968; a change in policy and direction of the Continuation Class will be in effect.

There will be established within the Board of Education a permanent standing committee whose duties will be to act in all areas regarding the Continuation Class. such as discipline, morale, encouragement of students, developing prestige and a program between the school, parents and community.

The basic educational program will be changed in various areas with the introduction of new texts in Hebrew and history. Some form of social program will be used to encourage student participation and in use of the Hebrew lang-

The culmination of the Continuation Class will be the adopting of the "Study Tour of Israel" student tours. The Board of the Talmud Torah will actively seek the

support of the whole community in its efforts for these tours, by inviting various organizations to provide scholarships for these students. Further details will be of the new Board of Directors.

Closing Report By President Of Talmud Torah

I am now completing my secand final year as your President, and I would like to take this opportunity to thank my executive members, the Board of Directors and the parents as a whole for their co-operation and interest shown. I was very flattered by the number of parents who asked me to continue to serve for another term, however I personally feel that the past and future success and progress of our school depends on the infusion of new members, new ideas and renewed interest.

I would like to personally welcome all parents and other members of the community to the Annual Meeting on May 27th to be held in the Talmud Torah at 8 p.m. I would like to point out that there will be an election of 15 Board of Directors, of which 10 nominated are new parents who have never before served on our Board. It is to these parents that we look forward to the continuation and future success of our school.

Over the year we have made progress both administratively and educationally.

The introduction of By-Laws 2 years ago sets out in its preamble the high ideals of which the Talmud Torah stands for, and provides also the administrative guidelines to follow in order to carry out these ideals. The success of these By-Laws to govern our institution will be seen as the years go by as they stand the test of time, changing parents attitudes and other external forces.

In the educational field, our greatest problem is obtaining and retaining the highest quality teacher. Our only source for

Hebrew teachers at the present time is Israel, This is a costly and time consuming procedure. However we can see no immediate solution to this matter. The number of teachers available to our continent is minimum compared to the demand. We have tried to attract the best qualified teachers for our English Departments; of course we must comnete in this area with the Public School systems.

Due to changing educational trends such as Educational TV, Teachers Assistants, changing curriculum etc. the Talmud Torah will be faced with constant rising costs and demands for improvement. As our growth in our community is not keeping pace with increasing costs, it simply means that outside

EDITORIALS

Israel's 20th Anniversary

On May 14th, 1948, in Tel Aviv, the official Declaration, announcing the statehood of the new Israel was read to the world—undoubtedly the single most dramatic & most significant event in the history of modern Jewry.

And on this 20th Anniversary Israel's Yom Ha' atzmaut, what more fitting way for all Jews to remember that moment than to recall that —

"PROCLAMATION OF INDEPENDENCE"

Translated from the Hebrew, Israel Government Year Book, 1950

The Land of Israel was the birthplace of the Jewish people. Here their spiritual, religious and national identity was formed. Here they achieved independence and created a culture of national and universal significance. Here they wrote and gave the Bible to the world.

Exiled from the Land of Israel the Jewish people remained faithful to it in all the countries of their dispersion, never ceasing to pray and hope for their return and the restoration of their national freedom. Impelled by this historic association, Jews strove throughout the centuries to go back to the land of their fathers and regain their statehood. In recent decades they returned in their masses. They reclaimed the wilderness, revived their language, built cities and villages, and established a vigorous and ever-growing community, with its own economic and cultural life. They sought peace yet were prepared to defend themselves. They brought the blessings of progress to all inhabitants of the country and looked forward to sovereign independence.

Accordingly we, the members of the National Council, representing the Jewish people in Palestine and the World Zionist Movement, are met together in solemn assembly today, the day of termination of the British Mandate for Palestine; and by virtue of the natural and historic right of the Jewish people and of the Resolution of the General Assembly of the United Nations.

We hereby proclaim the establishment of the Jewish State in Palestine, to be called Medinat Yisrael (The State of Israel)

The State of Israel will be open to the immigration of Jews from all countries of their dispersion; will promote the development of the country for the benefit of all its inhabitants; will be based on the principles of liberty, justice and peace as conceived by the Prophets of Israel; will uphold the full social and political equality of all its citizens, without distinction of religion, race or sex; will guarantee freedom of religion, conscience, education and culture; will safeguard the Holy Places of all religions; and will loyally uphold the principles of the United Nations Charter.

We extend our hand in peace and neighborliness to all the neighboring states and their peoples, and invite prove far more recalcitrant. While this situation can prevail for awhile, it obviously cannot prevail forever. A nation with nearly one-third of its population as a separate minority is surely in for trouble if it keeps them as, 1 effect second-class citizens. Israel, as a Jewish state, is also obviously in for political changes of major proportions if, to avoid this problem, it takes in all this new Arab population as fullfledged voting citizens. The Arabs could then be a major political force.

Nor is this the whole of Israel's 'demographie'' problem. Jewish population itself is divided not by race or religion but by cultural background, education and outlook toward life and

Today's Israel is essentially the work of Westernized Jews from such places as Russia, Poland, Germany and America. These are the original Zionists and they still dominate the political, eonomic and social life of the

But in recent years Inere has been a shift in the immigration balance. In 1948 some 55% of immigrant Jews in Israel were from Europe or America; today they represent only 30%. Part of this proportional decline is accounted for by the new Ameration born in Israel, but the immigrants from Asia and Africa have grown from less than 10% in 1948 to over 25% today.


And for all that they are Jewish, they are quite different people — they look different, think differently and react differently, lacking the education. skills and progressive outlook of the Western people. At least among the older generation they tend to live apart, following their old ways of dress, food, manner and means of livelihood.

Finally, there is also a generation gap here—the gap between those who built the country out f a wilderness and know the price of their country, and those who (by youth or late arrival) found the country handed to them


