First Secretary Addresses U.J.A. Dinner


A capacity audience attending the 1960 United Jewish Appeal Dinner heard Mr. Raanan Sivan, 📙 First Secretary of the Israel Embassy in Canada, describe the current session of the United Nations Assembly.

Mr. Sivan, called in at the last 🔯 moment to replace Ambassador Yancob Herzog, who had taken suddenly ill, came to Edmonton directly from the United Nations General Assembly in New York. He spoke of the Arab leaders who talked peace at one moment, and of the elimination of Israel the next. He described Mr. Khrushchev's startling behavior. He also described the friendly relations which existed between Israel and the new African nations.




