MAJOR AMIR

Major Amir has a distinguished military record. He served with distinction in the Haganah during the Arab riots of 1936 and as a member of the British Forces Suicide Squad during World War II. In 1941 he was parachuted by the British behind the German lines in Yugoslavia, where he lead a partisan guerilla; band and helped organize Jewish] resistance to the Nazis.

After demobilization he became an intelligence officer with the Israeli \ Defence Army, participated in the liberation of Halfa and became Military Governor of the Haifa area. He moved up to the rank of Assistant Director General in charge of administration.

HOW MUCH IS ENOUGH?

The U.J.A. Campaign opened officially on May 1. This year, a goal of \$125,000 has been set. This is \$18,000 more than has even been raised in Edmonten's U.J.A. history, yet the campaign committee is fully confident of reaching it. Part of this optomism is easy to explain. Before the campaign opened, \$15,000 extra had already been pledged by a hand full [of men. All that is needed is an additional \$8,000 over what | was raised last year.

U.J.A. General Chairman Tevic Miller has expressed confidence that this community will respond once it hears and understands the compelling needs of 1962. The U.J.A. Campaign Committee and the Liaison Committee are determined that once and for all Edmonton's Jewish community will meet its obligations. Once and for all, Edmonton will be able 📗 🦠 to stand proudly when the roll call of Canadian Communities is made at the end of the campaign season. In 1962, Canadian Jewry must contribute a minimum of \$6,250,000 to overseas needs alone, to help carry out the great work of the U.I.A. and the United Jewish Relief Agencies of Canadian Jewish Congress. Edmonton must bear its share in order to consider itself a responsible Jewish community.

The Edmonton Talmud Torah faces a staggering deficit | which can only be met if the U.J.A. meets its objective. We are all proud of our Talmud Torah and we boast of its recognition by outstanding educational experts. But a school [must have money on which to operate. Since Biblical times, Jewish communities have made Jewish education a prime responsibility. Can this proud Jewish community not meet l this obligation?

The work of the Edmonton Jewish Community Council goes on quietly, without fan-fare. Yet, without it, our community would be lost in choas. We have not far to go to see what happends in the disorganized, undisciplined community. The Community Council also provides grants to over fifty institutions of higher Jewish learning. It is easy to read this one sentence, but is it as easy to comprehend what fifty individual campaigns would mean to a community which already has a minimum of one campaign a month?

To our generation has fallen the task of the redemption of \[the people through the creation of the State of Israel, to a resurgence of Jewish vitality through education and through) the forging of strong and effective Jewish communities, through the idea of Community Council. The instruments a are there. We must have money in order to make them effective. Our goal is \$125,000. We cannot afford to almost a make it. We must exceed it.
