Negev Dinner Honours Louis Rudolph

Counsellor Of Israel Embassy Guest Speaker At Negev Dinner

Max M. Varon, Counsellor of the Embassy of Israel in Ottawa, will be the featured speaker at the 1962 Negev Dinner to be held on Sunday | evening, December 9, at the Beth Shalom Synagogue. The announcement was made by George Levine, Chairman of the Louis Rudolph Negev Dinner.

A native of Germany and a graduate of the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, Mr. Varon served as an officer in the Jewish Brigade. After his release from the Army, with the rank of Captain, Mr. Varon undertook many missions to Europe, Great Britain and Ireland, which were dedicated to important financial and rescue operations on Jewish j refugees.

Max Varon is intimately acquainted with the work of the Jewish National Fund, having served as a director of its head office in Jerusalem. From 1955 to 1959, he was Consul of Israel in New York. 


