## Youth Centre Day Camp Opens Registration

The Jewish Community Centre will again operate a Day Camp this year for two, three week sessions for boys and girls ages 4-12.

Ben Nathanson, a graduate of Dalhousie University who this year graduated with a teacher's diploma from the University of Alberta will serve as camp director. Mr. Nathan-

son has had extensive camping experience as a Judaea camper and staff member.

The first session will run from Monday, July 8 to Friday, July 26 and the second from July 29 to August 16.

The home base of the Day Camp will be the Community Centre which allows easy access to various parks

The camp will operate five days a week, Monday to Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and is open to children ages 4-12. Campers provide their own lunch and parents provide transportation to and from camp. Emphasis will be placed on outdoor activities, visits to places of interest as well as arts and crafts, dramatics and music.

The camp fees are \$80 for the full six week period, \$45 for three weeks and \$20 a week on a weekly basis. The minimum charge is for one week. Confidential arrangements can be made for those not able to pay the full fee by calling Uri Rosanzwolg, Executive Director. Applications can be secured from the Community Office by calling 424-2300 or 420-1287.

Application deadline is June 21st and campers will be accepted on a first come, first served basis.

## Our Fate and Faith

I sometimes believe that Jewish suffering and martyrdom is part of our legacy bequeathed from one generation to another for the purpose of keeping us united as part of some master plan. It is a terrible price to pay for unity but Jewish history has proven time and time again that external forces and crises have always pushed our internal differences or apathy to the background in order for us to meet the common enemy.

Perhaps this is our fate as the "chosen" people; perhaps our adversity is also our instrument for survival. But even if it is true, it doesn't make it any easier to accept the carnage of Munich, Lod, or the Yom Kippur War and the inhumane slaughter of innocent women and children at Kiryat Shlomo and Maalot.

Perhaps we are being unreasonable by virtue of wanting to be reasonable, by wanting to live in peace and be a nation among nations; perhaps we are being unreasonable in expecting tolerance and understanding and freedom from a world which accepts hunger, slavery, corruption and poverty as the norm.

There are those, even among us, who suggest that retaliation for Arab terror is not the answer; that retaliation repeats itself endlessly. This is true but the argument would only be valid if in the process world opinion determined once and for all who was the aggressor and who was the oppressed. As long as the United Nations functions with the cards stacked against Israel by nations dominated by the Soviet Union and/or Arab oil, Israel has no opportunity for justice.

Israel must therefore deal from a position of strength and her destiny is so intertwined with ours in the diaspora that we must help her maintain that strength and courage and fortitude. Deep down we must all realize that what happens to Israel will be decisive for Jewish history and generations yet unborn.

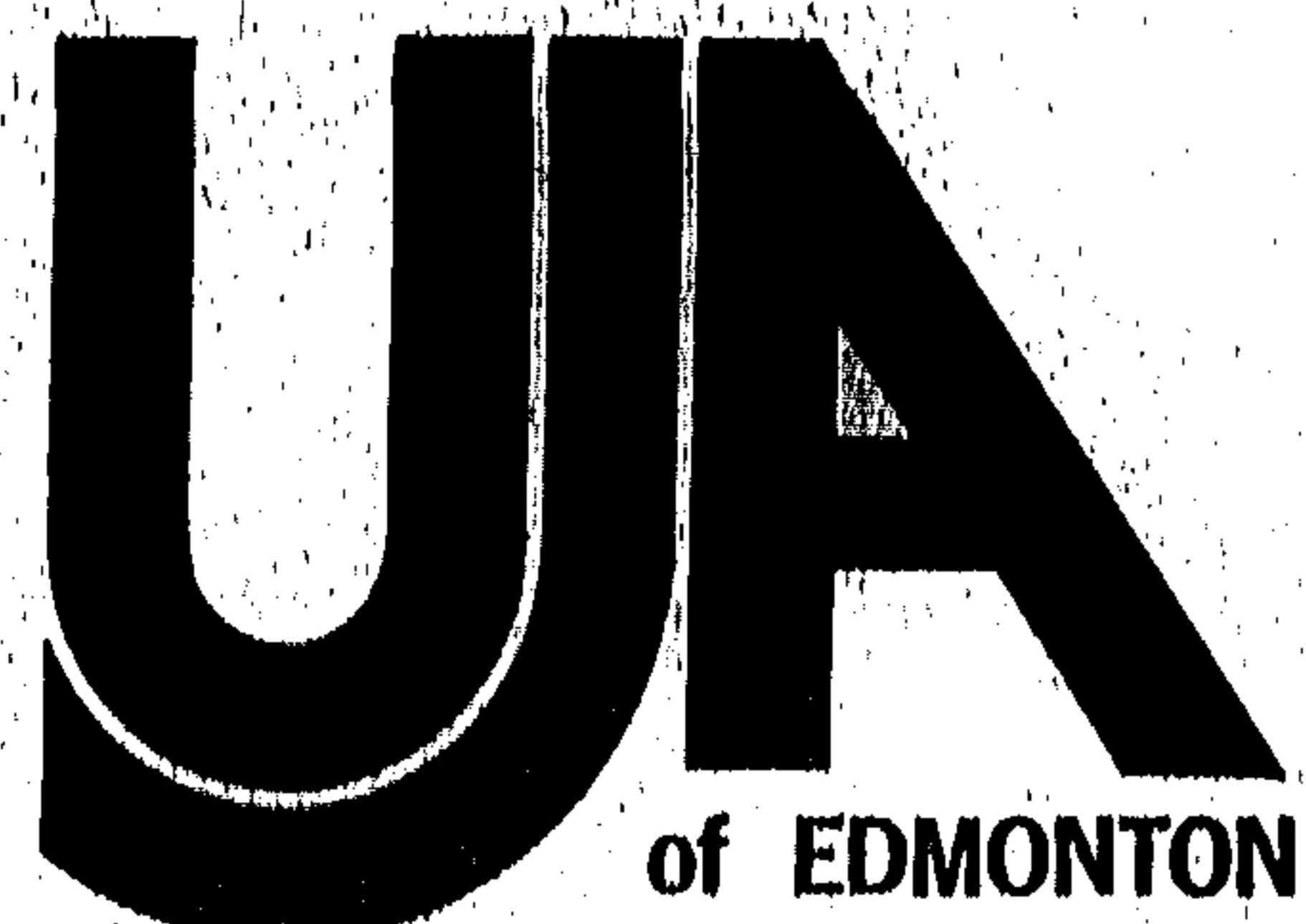

# Yom Kippur Campaign Leaders Honoured

During the Yom Kippur War, four men gave the Jewish Community of Edmonton outstanding leadership in rallying to the support of Israel.

These men were honoured with special presentations at the 1974 UJA closing Dinner on April 21.

The following is the presentation address made by Dr. Noel Jampolsky a vice-chairman of the 1974 Campaign with Harry Friedman and Bob Cristall.

Yesterday morning I received a phone call from Mr. Joe Katzin, UJA Campaign Chairman, that he was in Denver for the severe illness of a friend and that he was unable to get confirmed return reservations. He asked me, as one of his vice-chairmen, to help out and make the presentations this evening on behalf of United Israel Appeal to the four men we are honoring for their leadership at the time of the Yom Kippur War.

These four men are: Mr. Mel Friedman, Q.C., Mr. Joe Shoctor, Q.C., Mr. Larry Rollinghor, Mr. Mickey Dlin.

We are honoring these four men for leadership, and I have been trying in my own mind

to define leadership for United Jewish Appeal. Exactly what is leadership? What does it mean or not mean? Leadership seems to be a very undefinable quality, but as I recall the events and campaign in October, and the actions of these men not only at that time, but also before and afterwards, I see characteristics emerge that seem to apply not only to one of them, but to all of them.

Many are the meetings I have attended with Mr. Mel Friedman and periodically Mel will interrupt the meeting with, "Gentlemen, you have overlooked etc., etc." . . . and we all stop and we listen, for Mel has that unusual talent that places him well above us.

When he speaks . . . he has something to say! And we listen! He gives us more than just experience. Mel provides us with sound judgement.

Mr. Joe Shoctor may not recall this episode from last fall, but I do. At one point, someone thanked Joe for something Joe had done, I forgot exactly what, but Joe's response was classic. In a rather gruff voice he replied, "No one should thank any Jew for doing what has to be done." Think about it. "No one should thank any Jew for doing what has to be done." Can you think of a better definition of individual duty? This is leadership! Joe also has that unusual talent at a meeting where he can actually make one change their own opinion.

We are all opinionated people and it takes eloquence to swing us to the leader's opinion and not only swing us but to make us believe and follow for the betterment of United Jewish Appeal and the campaign. This is a quality that is shared by Mel, Larry and Mickey. The ability to persuade.

At the time of the October War we were all in confusion. There was chaos. No one knew what to do or how to do it. We phoned constantly to United Israel Appeal and others for guidance and gradually vague concepts filtered from national office to us. But Larry Rollinghor steps in. It was still confusion. And then Larry is an amazing man; Larry has that rare talent of organization. He is an efficient man and he transforms us from a disorganized group into an efficient functioning unit. We do not waste energy as a group or as individuals. Somehow, Larry prevents this. He sets deadlines and follows us up, and yet, despite crises or unforeseen problems, Larry never panics.

And there is Mr. Mickey Dlin. Mickey has a relationship to our community that is unique. The best word I can use to describe Mickey is "Statesman". Mickey can chair a meeting where there is war, where disagreements are violent and tempers are short, and in a few short words, again and again, Mickey cannot only settle the friction, but even more important he can bring the meeting together, so

that we all refraction as a unit, together, for the betterment of the cause of United Jewish Appeal.

Mickey, we are going to miss. This may be Mickey's last year for Edmonton United Jewish Appeal, as he is moving from national office to us. But Larry Rollinghor steps in. It was still confusion. And then Larry is an amazing man; Larry has that rare talent of organization. He is an efficient man and he transforms us from a disorganized group into an efficient functioning unit. We do not waste energy as a group or as individuals. Somehow, Larry prevents this. He sets deadlines and follows us up, and yet, despite crises or unforeseen problems, Larry never panics.

All of our leaders have shown themselves to be true leaders for United Jewish Appeal by their own gifts. It would be impossible to demonstrate your own belief in your own cause if you were not prepared to make leadership gifts.

I now have a strange opinion. I do not consider time an outstanding factor, nor duty, nor sacrifice. For if time spent on the campaign, or duty or sacrifice were primo

requirements for awards, then ladies and gentlemen, we would be faced with the situation where every single person sitting in this room, and many not here, should receive awards, for all of us are aware of the fantastic efforts of our community and hours and hours of time and sacrifice by each of us. No we are honouring our leaders for judgement, persuasion, organization and statesmanship.

And so ladies and gentlemen, UJA has asked us to present on their behalf special medallions. As we call our leaders to accept these awards I would like you to applaud each one individually as I call their names, for individually they deserve our applause. Mr. Mel Friedman, Q.C., Chairman, United Jewish Appeal, Emergency Campaign; Mr. Joe Shoctor, Q.C., Co-Chairman, United Jewish Appeal, Emergency Campaign; Mr. Larry Rollinghor, Co-Chairman, United Jewish Appeal, Survival Fund and Mr. Mickey Dlin, Co-Chairman, United Jewish Appeal, Survival Fund.

# Community Council Committee Highlights Reflect Productive Year

## Community Relations

The highlight of the Community Relations Committee's effort was the winning of an award for its audio visual program on The Jewish People, which was presented by the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds of New York in its annual competition. Requests for this cassette and slide presentation continue to come in from various elementary schools with enthusiastic response to the program. A new program on Passover has also been prepared. The committee continued its work in safeguarding the interests of the Jewish Community through letters to the editor, its concern with Soviet Jewry, and steps aimed at eliminating the distribution of hate literature.

Following the Yom Kippur War, a speakers bureau was established to address various groups on Israel's position and the committee cooperated with the National Canada Israel Committee in a one day seminar in Edmonton to explore effective means of presenting Israel's position in the broader community. The committee also was represented on the Alberta Cultural Heritage Council.

## Kashrut

The Kashrut Committee, made up of equal representation from both congregations and Community Council, continued to wrestle with the problems of maintaining kosher facilities in the community. Despite many problems regarding quality, prices, service and an increasing deficit due to higher costs and lower consumption, the continued provision of kosher products and meats in the community remains the prime objective and concern.

The committee was instrumental in securing a new shochet and mohel for the community, in facilitating the opening of a new kosher butcher shop and in helping make available kosher facilities in two hotels for community and private functions. The need to secure a mashgach and upgrading quality and service are objectives for the coming year.

## Publicity And Publications

Continuing to provide free, valuable publicity service to all organizations in the community, the Community Newspaper reaffirmed its position as an organ of the Community Council primarily. More news about Council activities was published, the paper continued to expand to include feature articles of interest on Soviet Jewry, Israel, Jewish education and Jewish life in general and continued to be the major, all-inclusive source of information for all community affairs.

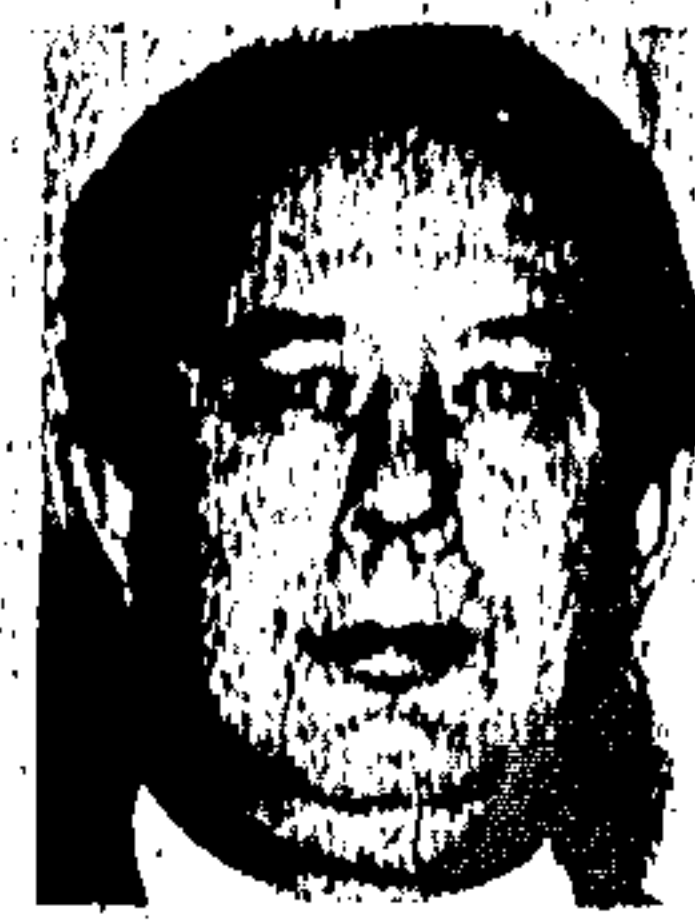

## AZA Celebrates Golden Anniversary

Beginning with a proclamation issued by Mayor Ivor Dent, declaring May "A.Z.A. of the B'nai B'rith Youth Organization month," and culminating with the A.Z.A. Father and Son Alumni Brunch on Sunday May 26th, local A.Z.A. members joined with 1800 other chapters, throughout the world in celebrating the golden anniversary of the world's largest Jewish youth organization.

A.Z.A. had its modest beginnings in Omaha, Nebraska in

1924 and called itself "ALEPH ZADIK ALEPH For Young Men". It deliberately chose Hebrew letters to offset the influence of the Greek letter societies which usually excluded Jews and to emphasize their concern for Jewish traditions and values. Recognition of A.Z.A. came one year later with its adoption by B'nai B'rith. From its beginning, it has included three members of its youth on its highest governing board, the AZA Supreme Advisory Council.

Since its founding, the members have realized over two million dollars through their International Service Fund. On a local level, the two A.Z.A. chapters, Mandel Bloomfield, founded in 1930 and Ben Zvi, founded in 1964, have been deeply involved in community activities, assisting in fund raising projects both in the Jewish Community and the general Edmonton community. Programmatic areas include Judaism, Community Service,

Israel, Social Awareness and Soviet Jewry.

The organization stresses leadership training on a progressively advanced basis from local chapter, local council of chapters, district and finally international level. Recently Edmonton has seen Jack Mintz elected to Grand Aleph Godol (1969-70) and currently Marshall Shoctor holds the position of International Mazkir (Secretary). Many A.Z.A. alumni now hold senior positions in our community, in-

cluding both our current and future president of the Jewish Community Council.

Dr. William Meloff is regional director for the B'nai B'rith Youth Organization and Herb Leon is BBYO Board Chairman for North West Canada Council. Newly elected presidents of the AZA chapters in Edmonton are Barry Lyman of Ben Zvi and Dave Kauffman of Mandel Bloomfield.
