

Jewish Family Services will hold its 22nd Annual Meeting on Tuesday, January 25th, 1977. According to the Constitution, the Jewish community-at-large may submit nominations for the Board of Directors that will be elected at this meeting. Nine members are elected annually to serve a three-year term.

This notice is hereby given in accordance with Article 1, under membership of the Bylaws of the Jewish Family Services, 'notice of nominations shall be made to the Jewish Community not less than one month prior to the annual meeting. Nominations shall be accepted from the

Jewish community-at-large if submitted in writing, with written acceptance by the nominee prior to the annual meeting. If an election is necessary, it shall be held at the annual meeting by closed ballot".

Anyone wishing to nominate a Board Member may do so by submitting the name of the nominee in writing to the office, 606 McLeod Building, or to any member of the Nominating Committee, one month prior to January 25th, 1977. The consent of the nomince must be included.

Nominating Committee Members are Mr. Herb Leon, Mrs. Judy Goldsand and Mrs. Dorothy Tapper.

For the first time in the twenty-three year history of the Jewish Community Council, a woman has been nominated and elected by the Board of Directors as President of the Council.

Mrs. Florence Singer was elected Community Council President at the first Board of Directors meeting following the Annual Meeting on November 1, 1976.

NCSY Seminar Dec. 22 - 28 to be Held In California

Yeshiva University and and the West Coast Region of the National Conference of Synagogue Youh are again sponsoring the West Coast Winter Seminar. This week-long event will be taking place near Malibu, Calfornia on December 22-28.

Yeshiva University, fouded in the late 19th century is known for its program which enables students to recieve some of the best Jewish scholarship in the world and takes excellent secular students at the same time. The Youth Bureau of the Community Services Division of Y.U. co-ordinates the educational aspects of the seminar, publishing source books for eight study levels, and sending senior students from Y.U. to serve as advisors.

The purpose of the seminar is to teach participants about their culture and history, through practical experience and study sessions, and to instill in them a desire to perpetuate the study and practice of Judaism.


Seminar also gives one a chance to meet others from all areas of the West Coast Region, Alberta, British Columbia, Washington, Oregon, California, Arizona and Colorado.

This year, the seminar will take place at Camp Hess Kramer, an outstanding, modern site, located 30 kilometers (18 miles) from Los Angeles. Hess is on the shore of the Pacific Ocean and in the midst of the Sanat Monica Mountain Range Participants may walk on the seashore, climb moun-

tains, play tennis, basket-ball, volleyball and football among other things, during leisure time. Temperatures go down to 10 degrees C (46 degrees F) at night and 25 degrees C (77 degrees F) during the day.

Those who are going from Edmonton will fly to Vancouver and from there take a bus. About seven days will be spent observing the sights and sounds of Vancouver, Seattle, Portland, San Francisco and/or Los Angeles. Those interested will decide among themselves, and possibly others from Vancouver and Seattle, what they want to see and do.
