

All groups have the opportunity of studying under a staff of distinction gathered together from all over Canada, the United States and England.

The Banff School of Fine Arts Choir, a group of some seventy voices, is an important and enjoyable part of the work of the Music Division. Students and staff alike take part in presenting this varied and entertaining program.
