## CERAMICS DIVISION

#### INSTRUCTOR: MRS. SYBIL LAUBENTHAL

The 1955 Ceramics Class has consisted of both beginners and advanced students, including some who are here for the second year.

These students have learned how to prepare clay for use, and have been given practise in developing slab, coil, freeform and "wheelthrown" ware. The main emphasis, however, has been on work with the potters wheel. Advanced students have completed more complicated pieces such as teapots, coffeepots and beverage sets.

The glazes have been compounded by the students and the various methods of glaze application are evident on the various pieces displayed. All ware is made from domestic stoneware clay fired to high temperature.

The Students of the Weaving Division are exhibiting examples of clothing fabrics and household textiles, using pure silk, cotton, linen, jute, bamboo, and native grasses. The weaves include Beginners' Studies, Bronson, Twills, Summer and Winter, M's and O's, Huck, Crackle, Damask, and varieties of spaced denting and modern textures. These have been worked out on hand weaving looms, carrying from four to sixteen harness frames.

INSTRUCTOR: W. V. CRICH, F.R.P.S.



Stress has been placed on pictorialism and the aesthetic viewpoint rather than on photographs of a commercial aspect.

During the summer, many of the class, formerly strictly color addicts, have been converted to the use of black and white materials.

The wealth of photographic subjects available include many nature studies, as class field trips have included the study and classification of wild flowers, as well as of birds and animals.
