Meeting, March 6, 2000 - Native Cultural Arts Museum, Grouard, Alberta

• Agenda:

Reports:

• Treaty #8 Project Report:

Discussion included: a) the Education Kit (video/lure card), b) display loan form, and c) the Oral History tapes. With Peter Goertzen and Monika Kirtley-Wark away we could not have a full report.


- a) The <u>video</u> to accompany the education kits is being made at Grande Prairie College. A draft text has been sent out and David Leonard had responded with so corrections, we hope that they will make. A new <u>lure card</u> has been ordered and will be ready to accompany the kit and the display.
- b) The display is currently at Grande Prairie Regional College. When sites get the display there is a nominal charge that is being kept for expenses against the display in the future. So when you get the display, expect to sign a form and to pay a small fee (museum members fee is less than non-members).
- c) Oral History tapes that were made as an add on to the regional project have been turned over to the Grande Prairie Museum archives. Some are also with display/or at Dunvegan.

• Regional Project - Brochure Report

Fran reported that Marilee Toews from Fort Vermilion informed us of an opportunity to have our brochures distributed in all of central Alberta (35 locations). She faxed us the information and we (Peter & I) have now shipped boxes of brochures to central Alberta for this program. There was a cost involved of \$240.75, which was paid for out of the regional grant.

• Treaty #8 - Symposium Tapes

Vicky has looked at all the videos from the Treaty #8 Symposium and said that they are a great source of information for those working on projects to do with native affairs and native history. They could be useful, but have some sound quality problems. The workbook that goes with them is excellent.

• Museum Grants - coming to the Peace

Fran brought out the list of grants made by Museums Alberta last year, marked with green spots for the 'green stuff' that came to the Peace. It looks a lot better than it did a few years ago, when we were not applying for and not getting many grants. The workshops must be paying off for our members. Way to go!

• Heritage Fair - Peace River, May 12 & 13th, 2000

Brochures were passed around and both Vicky and Diane spoke about this special event to encourage students to become interested in 'history'. We should all be encouraging our schools and our museums to be involved. (all should have received the brochures).

Along with this years fair there will be a contest - Design a Northern Alberta T. Shirt Logo. This contest is open to anyone. Just send them in to Diane at the Peace River Centennial Museum.

Program Committee - Museums Alberta Conference

Vicky told the meeting about the annual M.A. Conference and that the theme will be on *Multiculturalism*. They will be offering two pre-conference workshops: a) interpretive programming, and b) 'the jokes on us' - incorporating humor in our history. The conference will be in Red Deer this year and be earlier than usual, in late September, early because of availability of accommodations. She said the venue this year will be less expensive, also. They are planning more networking opportunity, longer nutrition breaks. More time for the trade show, not enough time last year. She will tell you more in June, and the materials should be out about then.

• Peace Country Classic Ag-Show March 9, 10 & 11, 2000

The theme of this years show is 'Winds of Change'.

We had asked to be in Clarkson Hall, along with the Grande Prairie Museum. This wish has been granted and they will now use the Old Timers Cabin for workshops. We will share a space in Clarkson Hall and are setting up the display on Wednesday, Mar. 8th from 3 to 5 pm. Treena, Fran and Ed will be there.

Grande Prairie Museum is going to have a raffle and will have a volunteer on duty. We were asked to also have a volunteer on duty. Ed Carlson has been working on this and talking to various members.

From a suggestion from our December meeting, Peter has asked Lars Loberg of Valhalla Centre to do some 'winds of change cartoons' for the booth. These are cartoons of activities early and late - an activity in 1905 - and that comparable activity now. These cartoons will be accompanied by artifacts.

The 'Spirit of the Peace' will have its video being shown, our brochure will be passed out, and members have been asked to offer their brochures. Maxine brought along a flail to be used in the display. Thanks Maxine.

• Grande Prairie Tourist & Interpretive Centre

• Computers, Software - Possible Regional Grant

Fran informed the meeting that there is a possibility of us getting a regional grant for the software, hook-ups and education components of getting our museums records on computer.

She had phoned a number of the museums who have computers and are getting computers and asked about what programs they were thinking about getting and got quite a remarkable positive answer of 'Virtual Collections'.

She had then talked to Charlene Garvey at Museums Alberta, who sent along a grand package of information. In their conversation they also came to the conclusion that if so many museums were trying to do the same thing, at the same time that it might be financially prudent to purchase the program in quantity and take the training and such together - getting a better price.

It is important that the museums wanting to get in on this do a 'needs assessment' in preparation for doing it. This package is available trough Charlene.

A committee was struck to study these possibilities, and to do it right away as a regional grant would have to be in by the end of April. The committee includes: Maxine, Vicky and Peter (picked in his absence). There were eight museums present who thought that they would be interested in doing it, and a few others that weren't sure.

Maxine has already ordered the Virtual Collections software and had done a for of studying on it. She brought along the introduction disc from that program and from Past - Perfect which is from the U.S. She said that Virtual Collections is very adjustable, and adaptable to different collections and needs.


(She showed these two programs in the afternoon to those interested, while the rest toured the museum.)

If successful the person who is hired will be developing a program for tours of the Historical Society's Heritage Buildings at Walter Wright Pioneer Village. The successful applicant will also catalogue any new acquisitions as well as work in the new archives under the direction of the Archives Committee.

Our Heritage Week for B.C. was February 20 - 26. We had our display down at the Dawson Mall, all day on Saturday, February 26th. He said that then Tom Williams used the building as a home. This outpost building is still standing, on land owned by Brian Fast. A neighbor, John Henken, wants to see it restored. So, here starts another project in 'saving a heritage building'. We wish you and your associates 'good luck' in this venture.

Busy first quarter - 422 visitors, including four tours and two education programs. In 1999 the museum had a total of 4220 visitors, accessioned 120 artifacts from 26 donors.

On February 8, 2000 the museum had its annual meeting. Maxine Nordin was elected Chairperson for another term. Jamie Babcock, Town Councilor was elected to Vice-Chairperson, Linda Taylor - Secretary, Judy Smith - Treasurer. Louisa Rich, Jack Burley and Jean Reid - directors. Thank you to Erwyn Marx & June Badiuk for their years of service.

I was asked to assist with the planning of the Town of High Prairie's 50th anniversary homecoming, scheduled for July. (Note: details in June)

I have been busy with the Relay 2000 which will be in High Prairie on the 16th of March. The Museum is preparing an exhibit on the Grouard-Peace River Trail. Thanks to Diane of the Peace River Museum for her assistance and to Willie Marx, the author of the book on the trail. Thanks to Linda Taylor and June Badiuk for their painting skills. The display will be unveiled at the Relay 2000 exhibition and B.B.Q. at the Agriplex. Exhibit will then be available to other museums and schools.

I have been working on grant applications and applying for summer work positions. We have been very busy since January creating an edu-kit on the history of the Cree. Thanks to a Museums Alberta Grant and a donation from Telesat we were able to hire an additional staff person to gather the information together in the kit. The kit covers transportation, food gathering and production, life style, etc. They combine hands on materials, videos, photos and activities suitable for a large range of learners. We will have them available for use by this September.

I want to remind everyone that the Citation 1 workshop on Research happens here in Grouard May 5 and 6. On the 6th I have arranged for the use of the computer lab so we can all try our hand at researching on the Internet. I spoke to Audrey about the Springboard session in Beaverlodge conflicting with the Research course and she will try to get another date. Just be sure to go to that Springboard workshop too. Audrey said it would be later in May.

Our visitation continues to climb. In 1998 the museum hosted 1300. We had 1993 by December '99. Our year runs June to June and to date we have 2200 visitors. I am finding myself almost getting upset that there are so many visitors and I can't get my paperwork done! Isn't that a silly thing? But here is hoping, with any luck, we will be adding a work study student

to the museum. This will provide me with some much needed assistance and give me someone to talk to besides the four walls.

We are working with the University of Albert in the hopes of bringing up they're recent display "Treaty 8 and the Northern Collecting of Dr. O.C. Edwards". This would be exciting to have with our Treaty 8 display, but the final dates need to be confirmed. Also, planning to change our displays. We will be placing better lighting in the tall free standing cases. That should improve viewing.

Historical Photos, Valleyview

Sandra told the meeting of collecting old photos from a number of sources in Valleyview and having them enlarged, mounted and framed, with 4 or 6 to a frame. 
