Leaving Port Robinson, Ont. on May 9th, 1911. On the 11o'clock train for Welland station, where we take a buss to the M.C. and from there we take the LH. & B. to Toronto, and as we pass along on the train on the mountain above Beamsville and Grimsby and Winona, it is a beautiful sight as the cherry trees were in bloom and the orchards and vineyards in such good order, and also the gardens, the whole making a fine picture. Then as we come down the mountain into Hamilton City, we get such a fine view of the city, with its many fine shade trees dotted

here and there among the grand we reas But it was a dreadful meht and on account Storm the Oletric lights were out and the Stears had Stokedrering and with the Wiender and and the rain lowing down. had a hard time getting to red Al & was mee l

here and there among the grand buildings. Then we pass on to Toronto where we change cars, after spending a few hours looking around the city, we take a C.P.R. train at 12.30. We reached Port Arthur about one on the morning of the 11th where we intended stopping to see my daughter Sarah which was at the station to meet us. But it was a dreadful stormy night and on account of the storm the electric lights were out and the st. cars had stopped running and with the thunder and lightening and the rain pouring down, we had a hard time getting to her home as she lived about 11/2 miles from the station. Well it cleared off and was nice the next day, so we had a look around the town. We stopped with them until the 12.30 train the next night,

3. then started on again, got in Winnipeg about one, had to wait about 11/2 hours for our train, finely we got started again and had a chance of seeing the Prairie for the first. Some of the fields were green and nice with the grain nicely up while there was great long stretches of freshly broken ground so black and rich looking. We arrived at Calgary on Saturday about 4 o'clock but it was raining and the most of the Hotells were filled up so we to wait some time for Ernie to get a Hotell with room for us to stay, but after several attempts he succeeded and we were very comfortable for the night and our super and breakfast on Sunday morning we started for Edmonton.

After we left Calgary sometime we got our first glimpse of the Rockies they looked grand. The most of the prairie was alike except in some places where it was dotted with small poplar bushes or trees. We had some Norwegians who could not talk English. There was one family of 9 and they were all singing and one of the boys played the mouth organ. They sang very nicely and nothing but hymns and most of the tunes were familiar. It helped to pass away the time and the two youngest had real sore arms where they had been Vaccinated. Well we arrived at Strathcona about 3 p.m. but had to wait there for nearly 2 hours as the busses filled up so soon to take the passengers over the river to Edmonton. Strathcona is a very nice town with the Saskatchewan

5. River dividing it from Edmonton. The river is a fine swift river with steep banks. We finely saw the Busses coming back so we got up into Edmonton at last and Ernie had a still harder time finding a hotel that was not full but we got one at last and after we had our supper we went out to see the city and go to church a fine big brick, and in fact there were a great many fine churches and other buildings. The church was just about full and also the gallery but as Ernie and I were half sick with a cold we had to go back and go to bed if it was early. Well we had to get up early as we had to take the six o'clock train for Edson where we arrived about one, and George and his father was there to meet.

It was the 16 when we got to Edson and the men had a tent up and stove and bed and table made of boards on stakes that is the only kind of table we had all summer you know. We did not get our trunks for 2 or 3 days but they came at last. We stopped in Edson until the 23 before we started on our trip over the Edson trail. There was said to be a wagon road and a buss running taking passengers into Grande Prairie 250 miles for \$40.00 buss fare they tried to sell us a ticket but we had decided to buy a team and wagon and such supplies as we had need so they gave \$475.00 for the horses and harness and blankets, and George bought the wagon for \$100.00 so we started on the 23.

The men though they had about 15 to 18 hundred [pounds] on and a fine fat strong looking team ought to take that much but we did not get on our way ½ mile before they were stuck in a mudhole and stumps so had to hire a man that came along to help us out then they some farther when they were stuck again so had to take of part of the load and go on about a mile and come back after the rest so we made 1 mile that day and pitched our tent for the night.

24th. Camp 1.

So today we got over 4 miles of bad road pitched tent again.

Camp 2. 25th.

Started on early and got 8 miles this day and pitched tent again.

Camp 3. 26th.

Started on our journey again and made 8 miles more today, witch brought us to the Frenchman's

After getting settled and supper over Grandpa went out see what the road was like, George had taken the horses out to eat grass and Ernie took a walk across the creek near the tent and sat down on a log after a while he heard a slight noise behind him. He saw a bear coming towards him he soon ran for the tent,

Camp5. May 29th.

I think we will have to stay here for some time as the road ahead is very bad and there is a gang of men not far off working on the road awhile. So Ernie and his father have gone and they come home for their meals they get 2.50 per day and board at home. So George decided he better take the horses back to Edson and get them reshod as they had part of their shoes pulled off, and when he got about 10 miles on his way back he had an encounter with a big bear. George was riding one of the horses and leading the other when suddenly out walked

Of course the bear being wounded was so angry he started in pursuit of him and after running uphill a long way he gave up the chase and went back so after George thought it safe he had to go back and hunt up the other horse. June 1st.

Well we only stayed here four days and we decided moving on the boys took part of the load on and came back and we moved on about 3½ miles.

June 2nd. Camp 6.

Grandpa was very sick last night with a bilious attack a man was going back to Edson today to get a load so I went out to send some letters out with him and get him to bring me our mail and there he had a cinnamon bear in his wagon he had just shot a little while before.

The weather is very warm but the nights cool. George brought me in a partridge and a rabbit he had shot and we found them very good as meat was a treat now and so far we have been comfortable of which we are very thankful to the Great Giver. We are some nearer the road gang here and the men only worked 7 day and decided to move on again. But George took the team and wagon back to Edson for some fresh supplies. So I went with him as we are now about 30 miles from Edson. So we started at 6.30 in the morning and got to Edson 5.30. So I went at once to the stores and did our shopping a supply of flour and oatmeal and groceries and more feed for the horses, for we were beginning to see by this time that there was no telling how long we may be on the road.

After our shopping was done we went to the Grande Hotell for our supper and the night but I was so tired over the ride I could hardly sleep but got the night through some way and had to rise early to get an early start back and such a beautiful sight met my gaze as I look out of the window on a beautiful bright morning. There was the Rockie Mountains [of] the Plaines - I ever saw them. They did look grand. Well after breakfast we go started and after another long teadious ride we arrived home at 7.30. We also saw some old people who were tented on the way waiting for the roads to get better. They showed me two bear hides he had shot. I heard they were worth 20.00. That is the people and I also heard after that were so disgusted with the road that they turned back and never came.

15. we got home on the 10 witch was my Birthday . So on the 11th and Prefared for another move So whe boys has gon on with a Part of the load as that is what will have to be done after this as there is to much for one load. We got home on the 10 which was my birthday. So on the 11th I baked bread and buns and cake and prepared for another move so the boys has gone on with a part of the load as that is what will have to be done after this as there is too much for one load. So on June 12 we started on again. We went about 5 miles today and pitched our tent near the Scotchmans that keeps a Stopping Place. After we got the tent up we had a hail storm then on 14 it rained all day so we could not go on. And on the 16 we are still waiting for the roads to improve. A man and his wife came along on horseback. Their names are Ferguson so they pitched their tent near us so I had company. They were from Vancouver and seemed nice

I had to walk most of the way and was very tired and sick when we stopped about 8.30 in the evening so we were all glad to lay down to rest.

But I got two letter from my children which cheered me up some. June 21 we are stopping over today and letting the horses rest we are still here as it is raining so much so Ernie took a lunch and went on to the Baptiste River to see how the roads are. On the 23 the boys took one load on and got back so we are starting on again. Today 24, had a dreadful time getting to the Athabaska river and it is the worst piece of road yet and had the horses down several times but finely we camped in a nice little poplar grove until after Sunday. The boys went out and caught 2 nice big fish one was about 12 lbs and on the 25 we went for a walk and saw a nice garden for there are some people living at this river and they run the ferry across the river

Well we got over the river and on to the Baptiste River some 6 miles from the Athabasca River and spread our tent again. This is mostly Prairie around this river and any amount of grass and peas. We have the tent on the bank of the river and can see the ferryman coming and going across with the passengers there is a great many men going in with pack horses and men on foot carrying great loads on their back. One day a drove of horses and cattle and men came along and some of the men got on the ferry with the pack horses but when they got across and the ferryman came back for the other horses and colts

Their father and I kept going along the shore watching them. After they went about 1 mile in a bend of the river they managed to get on the shore on the other side. My was I glad when I saw them land. Then they had to walk back to the landing and come back on the ferry so that ended their rafting. When we first came here the river was low and about the nicest beach I ever saw such lovely stones of all sizes and shapes and colors. I would like a house built of them. I often walk up and down here and pick a few wild strawberries and wild flowers. There are such a variety of lovely flowers all the way from the Athabasca River to the Baptiste. The men made a stable here for the horses as it is cool nights and raining everyday.

But today it's nicer with only a shower in the P.M. The men put in most of the A.M. looking for the horses as they went back to the river but as they could not get across. They were found and brought back. So the men made a stable for them where they could get in from the flies and cold rains. 27th we have our tent pitched in a lovely spot on the bank of the river in a poplar grove with lots of wild flowers such as the wild rose, blue bells of Scotland, tiger lilies and others. There are some fruits such as black currant and gooseberries and raspberries only not very many of any kind.

This is the 28 and it rained all the forenoon but it cleared up by noon so George and Ernie started out for the road camp some few miles farther on to get a job of working on the road.

June 29. The horses are gone again so the boys were all the P.M. looking for them but did not get them and it was still raining and disagreeable.

30th. Well the boys got home about noon today with the horses and a man brought me some letters - one from Lillian and one from Mrs Clark and one from Mrs Ruddell and one from Sister Margarett.

July 1st. Rained nearly all night and still raining. Had a man in awhile on his way to the Peace River. It is so lonesome we are glad to

have someone to talk to.

July 2nd. Well it cleared up fine and bright but clouded up in the P.M. and the river has risen so high it is not safe to go across although there are men going over nearly every day and some day a good few. This is such a nice place for camping and abundance of grass for horses that a good many people stop somewhere on this flat to rest and feed and I got enough strawberries today to make a short cake.

July 4th. Still showery today but the boys started back to Edson with the horses to get in fresh supplies. We are so much longer on the road than we expected that we have to keep enough supplies ahead until we get to our journey's end.

July 5. Well I had another letter brought me from my girls and these letters are always a great treat and bits of sunshine and also a letter from Mr Hagar. Well we have fine weather again and there are a lot more people passing on to the Peace river mostly all either on foot or with pack horses but here the roads are very bad so we are likely to remain here sometime yet.

July 6th. Nothing of any importance but still more lonesome without the boys.

7. Still raining again.

8th . Still raining as we have more of that than anything else only sometimes it is steady rain and sometimes it only pours down.

July 9. This is Sunday and we are looking for the boys back. We took a long walk up on the mountain the way the boy are to come. We are about 56 miles from Edson here.

Well as we did not meet the boys we went back to our shack and about 8 o'clock a couple of men came along who had seen the boys at Mabens Stopping Place and sent word they would not be in until the next day as it is raining so much so we let the men stay in our tent with us over night.

July 10. Well the boys got back about 5 in the evening but left the horse feed at Mabens so had to go back for that. They had a pack saddle for on of the horses and a riding saddle for the other so as they had their blankets and food they could take turns in riding the one horse going out to Edson but would have to walk coming back.

11. It is cleared off fine again and there is a man stopping here on his way in to the Grande Prairie by the name of Forster and his 3 boys with horses

26. and oxen and cattle and wagon load of stuff.

July 13. The boys got back from Mabens with the feed as it is hot and fine today. So had a visit from a family of Rays that are tenting on the other side of the river there are three more families living over there but all laid by waiting for the road to dry and had the 2 Mrs Fosters over to see me. Well as it has still continued fine.

July 14. The boys has taken the trunks and horse feed on a few miles on the other side of the river as far as they can until noon when they are to cache them and return to us the afternoon. So we can move on the rest of the stuff the next day. Well when night came we were very anxious about them and was down to the ferry watching for them with the

ferryman but not until nearly ten did we see them coming. It seems when it was on to noon they were on the lookout for grass for the horses for the next day when we would put up our tent and as they were riding they saw a small lake that did not look very far away through the bushes. So they thought they would go in and see if there was any grass. So they unhitched the horses and fed them and unloaded the trunks and put them in hiding spot and then started for the lake but the trees were very thick and after they traveled what they thought a long way they decided it was too far away and started back for the road and after going sometime George thought the road was one direction and Ernie the other so they separated and Ernie soon came to

to the road but George did not come and George came on to a bear. He was frightened as he did not have his gun so he climbed a tree and hallooed to Ernie and he heard him but when he started to go to him he did not holler again so could not find him and as George was so hard of hearing Ernie could not make him hear. So after sometime the bear went away and George came down and started for the road but he was lost and after traveling some 8 or 10 miles came out about 6'o'clock and Ernie had given up hope of finding had hitched up the horses to go back to us to get blankets and food and go back to find him the next day. After driving some miles he came up to where George

came out of the bush very pale and ready to drop could hardly speak. But that was a dreadful thing to happen he had a very narrow escape as the nights are so cold and nothing to shelter him. But when they started that morning there did not seem to be anything to fear as they had been over the road before but about 5 that P.M. such a fear or dread of something came over me while I was sitting outside that I went inside and fell on my knees and prayed my kind Heavenly Father to protect my boys little knowing the danger poor George was then in but God spared him once more. Praise his Holy Name.

July 15. Well we started on our journey again and got to the top of a hill and stopped and had our dinner then made on down to the stopping place and pitched our tent again until after Sunday. This is not a nice place to stop but could do no better and I walked

Camp 10. Sunday 16. Very hot today but clouded up and rained again at night on the 17 we started on again and camped again for the 11 time. We only made 21/2 miles today and I walked that. So the boys went back for the trunks. So we are on now about 16 miles from the Baptiste river that makes it about 72 miles from Edson that we have come from the 23 of May to the 18 of July pretty slow traveling is it not. the trunks on to the Little Smokey River. Still more rain last night. While the boys were away Grandpa and I went out on a raft on a lake fishing but we had the same luck as usual although there are lots of big fish here but the lake was too rough.

19. We got on to the Little Smokey and pitched our tent. Camp 12. This is a beautiful spot, partly prairie with clumps of bushes and here and there a large spruce tree. So I put up a sort of hammock under one of the big trees. We have had to stop here about 2 weeks we are now on 76 miles and on the 20 the boys took the trunks on to the Loney river some 12 miles we have had dreadful times coming this far in the mud and rough roads. Sometimes long stretches of rough road where the trees has been cut leaving

the stumps about 1 foot high and so thick the boys got back and Billy was so lame. As the ferry here is not finished they have to either ford it or go on a raft.

25. the river has started going down has lowered over 1 foot. Geo shot another rabbit so we had a stew and the boys went out and got 2 qts of gooseberries and we are treated with another thunder storm. The horseflies are very bad. There are lots of pasture here for the horses but the flies are so bad they come and stand around the big smudges build for them we have also to keep smudges near the tent as the mosquitoes are bad.

26. fine and windy today. The river still receding.

Very tiresome trying to put in the time.

27. This is a fine day so Grandpa started back to Edson to do some business and get a few things. Ernie is out fishing and brought in 3 fish, not very large ones. I was out fishing to but go nothing but bites. I do think it so mean of the fish to come and take my bate off my hook and then skido as if they did something smart. The boy got me 4 qts. more of gooseberries. Well I had a short chat with Mr and Mrs Ferguson on their way back from Grande Prairie and give a good report.

28. Well there are lively times today so many of the people that have been delay on the trail and have just got this far. First some young English men with 24 wagons and ox teams and horse teams, then Mr and Mrs Metcalf and their three children and their cow

Mrs B. and boy riding horseback and driving about 30 head cattle, then the men with three wagons 20 head horses and others passing on through but as the ferry is not ready to carry people over yet those families and wagons load have to lay over here.

July 29. Two more families of Fosters and each one has 2 teams and wagon loads and each of the women drives a team as well as them men and one of the women has a little boy not 2 years old. Then there is a family of Rays with 5 children and 3 wagon loads and horses so there is quite a town here now with 6 tents and about 15 wagon loads. We had another heavy rain last night. Well some men got in with the new cable so as the ferry is done there was 6 of us women went down to the river on Sat. to see the

ties pourning 31 st

36.

men launch the ferry. They had quite a time so when it was in the water about one dozen men went over on it to do some road work so we could all go on it next Monday.

30. I had a treat of about 2 qts. of new milk the E. boy gave me and then when Mrs Metcalf came she would give me some and the boys got altogether about 10 qts gooseberries and these I preserved for our journey. Then today Mr and Mrs Ray went out and picked a big pail full. Well we are making another start this morning 31st. After some delay we got over the river and on the way. But the first 5 miles is dreadful. The horse plunging in among the roots and snags in the mud and one of them got his leg fast in the roots but there was so many men on with us they helped the boys through. I though surely Jim's leg was broke but they got it out all right but most all the team got stuck

But we got to the Loney River about 5.30 on the first of Aug.

Camp 13. Some of the others went on through as far as they could before dark while some did not get to the Loney until the next day and it was only 12 miles and I walked most of the way. But coming down the hill Geo had the load upset for the first.

Aug. 2nd. Well I overhauled the truck and oh such a state everything was in, all mildew and rust. Some of the clothes about ruined. So I dried them all as well as I could and Geo went on about 4 miles where there was a lake and he brought me home 4 fish. And Mr Borden caught a very large fish.

3rd. As Billy is so lame we can't go on so will have to stay here sometime which seems to be our luck. So after doing washing and baking I went to call on one of my

neighbors. Then the boys are building a cache to store the trunk and other things as we intending when we start again to keep going as long as we can with only the one load. The lady that keep the stopping place here is all alone as her husband went on to the Prairie to locate so I had her to stop nights with me. Well Grandpa got home early this morning Aug. 4 very tired indeed. Billy foot is still very sore we can't tell what is wrong with it so Grandpa had an old Scotchman that was stopping over night to examine the foot and he found after sometime a piece of wood in the frog of the foot so he probed and got it out and then after it was well cleaned with carbolic and water it was well wrapped up to keep out the dirt. Had Mrs Hance here for tea and Mr and Mrs Metcalf came so we had more company. Had some more letters from my

daughters which is always one of

my great blessings.

Aug. 5th. Well Grandpa is just 60 years old today. Mr Metcalf and family came today and will stay here for a few days. Billy is still too lame to move on.

Aug. 6th. No rain today. And as Mr Hance came home he and his wife moved back to Edson.

8th. William and George decided to go on to Grande Prairie and file on their homesteads there are so many people passing every day with pack horses and on foot. They are afraid the best of the land will be taken up so they take their blankets and provisions enough to take them there and started. And they have 160 miles to go to where they got their homesteads. And Grandpa having just got home 4 days before,

40.

starting on this last trip from Edson which was 160 miles there and back. He traveled ton foot there to start again so soon he was just played out when he got to his journey's end so could not travel around the country as he intended doing to select the best there was left so had to take the ones near at hand. Well when they went away that left Ernie alone and George was to come back as soon as he located to help us and Grandpa put up a hay shack and stayed to make hay but as Billy's foot was on the mend and Ernie was looking after it every day cleaning it and bathing it with oil. He was also looking after some other horses that was laid up with the hoof rot and sores for the man that runs the stage but we intend to start as soon as Billy is able.

And since Mrs Hance went away I gave a few meals to people at 50 cents a meal and did baking for the others so made a few dollars that way.

9th. Ernie caught 2 more fish. Another shower last night.

10th. Billy is still improving.

11th. Another nice day but a

hard frost last night.

12th. Mr Forster came back from Grande Prairie where he had filed on his homestead and so did one of his sons and as he left his family at Edson he was going back to bring them in the winter as he could not get through with the wagon load of stuff he started with. He stored it here at the stopping place and one of his boys took 2 yoke of oxen and wagon back. So now we are buying some of his stuff to renew our supply such as flour and sugar and butter and dried

files and soupe · dunner Stias from again, we rere is a family here of Figurer

apples and soap.

13th. Rainy today. Had Mr Taft and son for dinner. That is that mail man.

14th. Still rainy.

15th. Nothing but rain.

16th. It is fine today so as Billy is alright and Ernie has put a piece of leather and shoe on his sore foot as it is tender so as not to lame him again we are preparing to start tomorrow. There is a family here of Fraizer men 2 bothers and a widow and her three little boys. She is a daughter to the oldest Mr. Fraizer so we made arrangements to travel with them and help one another. They have 2 yoke of oxen and one wagon load.

17th. Well we started about 7 this morning. Mr. Fraizer going ahead but soon came to the clay hill and their oxen got stuck so Ernie put our horses on but they don't pull together

43. and such a dreadful time in the mud with horses and oxen down in the mud and them all covered with mud then the men and Ernie carried brush and filled in the holes and put in logs so they were 5 hours getting their load up that hill. Then we had our dinner. Then after the horses were rested they took our load up in one hour and made to a little lake some 4 miles that day and drew our wagons up opposite and made a big bond fire between. Then Ernie would cult up a pole and fasten at each end of the wagon and a ridge pole across from one to the other than after taking the stove and other things out of the back of the wagon I would spread my bed down in the one half of the wagon box than he would put the tent over the pole letting it come down behind so as to make

and campel 15. trema all the

a shelter on the back and Ernie would gather brush and make his bed under the wagon facing the fire so we had it very comfortable most of the time. Then Mrs Lewis and her boys slept inside of her wagon and the men under their wagon facing the fire so we did this every night for 2½ weeks on our way in. So this is the 14th camping place.

18. Got started again this morning but the roads so bad and stuck so often that only made 4 miles more today and camped 15.

19. Just go nicely started when got Mr Frazer load stuck again for 3 hours. Ernie helping them all the time so they pulled us through in less than ½ hour. So we only made 3 miles today and camped 16. and as this is Sunday 20.

we will lay over and rest today. It rained quite hard last night.

21. Made very slow progress today as the road are still worse on account of the rain and Jim would baulk so they had to hitch on and help us 3 times this a.m. But the road not so bad in the p.m. and we met George about 2 p.m. and he turned in and helped so we made 8 miles today.

Camp 17. 23. Some better roads and so made better time and got some 2 miles of House River about 10 miles today and I walked most of the way.

Camp 18. Aug.24. Started again. Got to House River and stopped for dinner than made 12 more miles in the p.m. that being 14 miles that day and then camped 19.

25. We started on ahead this time they not being ready and

their ox being lame got on about 15 miles when it started to rain so I got under a big tree until the boys got a camping spot and we turned out for the day. Got our suppers and went to bed.

Camp 20. As I got my feet wet I was not well last night. But we started again I made bread last night and when I was mixing it up there was 4 men came along on horseback and stopped to tell us they had seen Grandpa at Beaverlodge and sent word he was well, one of them a minister.

26. Started again got to
Sturgeon lake about 11.30 the
Frazers got there ½ hour later. So
as this is Sat we intended to stop
over Sunday here so Mrs Lewis
and George started off among the

Indians to get fish and potatoes. This is the Indian reserve and there is only one white man keeping store here and a Catholic Mission with two sisters teaching the Indian children. There is a fine garden at the Mission and beautiful flower garden we were not long with our tent up before there was a squaw with 2 papooses on a horse and her husband and more horses and more boys and girls, the whole family I guess. The boys had some rabbits so Mr Frazer brought one. Then Geo and Mrs Lewis came back and we had a treat of potatoes as this is the first vegetables since spring and they got a lot of fish to last us for several days. So in the P.M. as women went up to

the store to get something we got another hundred of flour for 9 here and some cheese then we went to the mission to get some milk but the sister were very kind and gave us some milk but would not take pay for it and told us to send in the morning and get some more. So Ernie and Quincy went and brought a nice pail full. There is most prairie land here and the Indians make a pretence of farming but have gardens but not much else. But they have houses made of logs with a fire place for the winter but live in tents in summer. They make a great many moccasins the squaws do. Ernie got a pair from them and the girls would stand and laugh at him and put their hands over their mouths

and laugh again and it made him angry so he left them. There is a lot turns out on Sunday to the mission to service to hear the priest. And there such a lot of anthills large ones too some 3 feet high.

28. Started on again to another Indian Settlement and stopped to buy some more potatoes and fish to last us until we get through. We went into one of the garden to look for some onions. There was an old chief and his wife and we had an Indian boy that could talk English as the Indians don't. Well while we were talking to them the old chief came up to me and took a hold of my coat sleeve and grinned.

28. After making our purchases this morning we started on from Camp 21. but we only made 8 miles today and camped again. 22. and started again on 29th from the Loney River to the Sturgeon River about 76 miles I walked about 50 miles.

the road very bad.

31. We made about 7 miles. But near the end of our journey we got to a dreadful piece of road and the Frazer men's load stuck such a long time than to make it so much worse it was raining all the afternoon. Just drizzling rain and while the men were stuck us women had to sit around on logs but I had an umbrella. But the poor men had such a time of it. Then just about

dark they got the load out than Geo brought our load through and when they were nearly through the horses fell down and Jim fell on a stump and hurt his shoulder. We had to stop our wagons this night in a grassy wet spot and wade around in mud and water too cook our suppers but when we went in our wagons to bed we were high and dry. But the poor men had it wet enough under the wagons but this is not the worst place we have had to tent. I can tell you the boys did not feel so full of fun tonight but we slept through for everyone was tired so we got up early as we generally do. It was always me that would start them up in the morning.

So they got our load through to abuil road by proon thom it took their over Strat prinile So we there again tented on comped made 3 miles terrible roads, I was making bread this day and I put the Springe in a Pail up on the load on & up fine and I would have

Then Geo would get up and get the fires going. Than the women would get breakfast. This was 23 tenting. Than on first of Sep. we only made 1/2 mile as we were in such mud hole and mud on ahead. The men went and cut a new road through to a bush road by noon than it took them all the P.M. to get Mrs Lewis load over that 1/2 mile. So we stopped there again tented or camped 24 times. Then on 2nd Sat. we made 3 miles, terrible roads. I was making bread this day and I put the sponge in a pail up on the load in the hot sun. It would raise up fine and I would have to take down and knead up down. If I had the stove our of the wagon I could have had it baked as the boys were away helping with

office Load Lo I had cooping when we stopes hage lot glo the day before and

the other load. So I had to finely put the dough in the baking pans so about stopping time we got our load through at last and I carried a pan of bread ready to go in the oven over the mud holes on to where we were intending stopping. So got the stove set up and started a fire to bake and get supper and make biscuits and cook beans for the next day and so we would not have to do much cooking when we stopped for dinner. They had to unload Mrs Lewis wagon to get it through this time as they had to do the day before and also other times. So this is the 25 camping place.

This being 3rd the Sabbath and a beautiful day we are resting as we have only made 20 miles in the last week and I walked about 1 miles of that. So we hope to make to the Smokey 20 miles more the next week as we have still bad road ahead. I am trying to give you and idea of the condition of the roads and what we have to go through but it is far worse than I can describe it. At one time when we came to a dry place of road I was driving the boys walking. We came to some bad mud hole but got through all right but we came to a timber road where the stumps were left about 1 foot high and so thick you could not dodge them. So Ernie thought he had better drive through there.

55.

He just got nicely on the load driving when on to the wheels ran up on a stump near the trees on the side of the road when Ernie pitched (camp 26) off head first and without thinking I made a grab for him and went down too in among the trees. Ernie was not hurt but I got my shoulder bruised and one leg so I could hardly walk for sometime but we were fortunate it was no worse.

Sep. 4. The men went with the road gang here and helped cut about 2 miles of road around a very bad low swamp. Then we made about 5 miles this day than camped for the 27 time. Then on the 5 again made a few more miles and came to the willow swamp when we had a dreadful time getting through had to double

up most of this time but a few more miles. Then camped 28 time. Then started again on 6th and a few more miles the same old way and camped 29 time. Started again on the 7th and made the Big Smokey this evening of the 7th. Had a big time getting down a long steep hill as the Frazer men had no holdbacks on their oxen even when they locked on other hills they could not venture on this as some part were nearly straight up and down. So our team had to take both loads down after locking both front and back wheels in taking down their loads I was afraid the load would come on the horses and the men were holding on the ropes behind the wagon but Ernie was driving and he got down at last.

So this is the 31 time we have camped on the 7th of Sep. So on the 8th we were to cross the big Smokey. They have the ferry ready by this time so we got on all right but a few days before this they did not have it ready so the teams had to swim across and they had to take the stuff all out of the wagons and raft them across and take the wagons apart and raft them across. So we escaped that bother. I forgot to mention back some 40 miles this side of Edson on what they call Breakneck Hill a very long dangerous hill about a mile long or more. Well on the top of this hill is what they call the Divide, it is 5,500 feet about the sea level. Sep. 8th. Well we put in all this

of the Big Smokey River as the hill is about 11/2 miles long. So Mrs Lewis and I got cold water and bathed his head and hands and he fell asleep. So when we had dinner ready he had his dinner he was better but not well all the rest

Oat meal was 1.40 for 8 lbs sack and there was no salt to be had at any price but when they had it was 20 cents lb. So was rice 20 per lb. and sugar the same. Flour was from 10 to 15.00 but the 10.00 was so bad could hardly use it. Then grandfather was no hand to cook anything thin for himself so he was pretty well used up. But although everything was so dear that was brought in we could get beef at 10 to 12 per lbs. and potatoes from 100 to 150 so that was not bad. Than on the morning of the 12 of September we moved over our tent on our own homestead.

65.

So we made about 21 mile on the 11th and the poor horses were glad of a rest as they were pretty well faged out. We had nice weather on 12 or 13th then it started raining again but still as Ernie had decided to take the homestead they had picked out for him he and his father went back to Bear Creek some 16 miles and back in the same day and as they were late and it being dark getting back they both laid down in the wagon box and went to sleep and let the horses find their way and they did until they got nearly home. They stopped and went to eating grass. That woke Grandpa so he started them on as they knew the road better than the men in the dark. The day we got our tent up here one of our neighbors came in to see us and

invited us over the next Sunday to a song service. So we went on 17 and was surprised to see so many out and things so comfortable. They had an organ and one of the young ladies played for the singing. We had a heavy frost on the 20. Had intended going for huckleberries before this but as they were so far away and they were using the horses putting up hay I did not get a chance to go until 21. Geo drove me down to Jonstons but the frost the night before had so cooked them that they were no good so I never got any. Geo got me about 4 qts. Saskatoons one day and that is all I got. So it rained most of this week but from 25 it has been fine weather. Geo went to building a log stable and Ernie went to the saw mill to work on the 18th as they were after the boys

Geo went to cutting logs to build a stable for the horses. So when he got it built he also went to the sawmill to work on the 5 of Oct. The boys were to get 40.00 per month and board. We are having fine weather this week and as the boys are away and Grandpa busy, I am so anxious for mail from my daughters that I rode one of the horses out to the office. Well I must tell you what Saskatoon is like. This is another town sight. Well there is a post office and a bank held in the front of a small log building and a restaurant in the back. Then there was a Co. store in another little log building called Reveillon. Then a little way from these there is another small log building.

But after wandering around for a long time I went back to main road and there are so many roads all over the prairie as people just drive anywhere they want to go. Well when I got on the main road I made up my mind to stay on it as I would be more likely to meet some
